# Reflections on the Journey from Easter to Ascension

Dear Beloved in Christ,

As we move through the beautiful month of May, we find ourselves in a unique and contemplative period in the Church year. Having recently celebrated the joyous and triumphant resurrection of Jesus at Easter, we now look toward his ascension. This time between these two significant events in the Christian calendar is a moment to pause, reflect, and absorb the profound lessons that this period offers.

Easter, with its message of hope, renewal, and victory over death, has filled our hearts with joy and gratitude. It reminds us of the boundless love of God and the promise of eternal life. The resurrection of Jesus is not merely an event of the past; it is a living reality that continues to transform our lives today. As we bask in the afterglow of Easter, we are called to carry this light into the world, sharing the good news and embodying the love and grace that Christ has shown us.

# Our pledge charity featuring in May is International Justice Mission (IJM) UK

IJM globally works with local authorities in 18 countries around the world to bring safety and freedom to those living in slavery and violence. We also have offices in a further ten countries which focus primarily on advocacy and resource mobilisation.



With your support, IJM works to tackle modern slavery (including forced labour slavery, forced scamming and the online sexual exploitation of children), human trafficking, violence against women and children and police abuse of power.

The UK office has been operating since 2005 and has offices in London, Edinburgh and Belfast. IJM's work in this country is mainly to raise resources to support work overseas, raise prayer support from churches and individuals and engage with the UK media and government.

## What is slavery?

Slavery is illegal almost everywhere—but 50 million children, women and men are trapped in slavery around the world

Traffickers use deception, threats or violence to force people into gruelling labour or sexual exploitation for little or no pay. These individuals are often denied adequate food or sleep, and they're often barred from leaving for school or medical care.

IJM addresses labour trafficking, sex trafficking and the online sexual exploitation of children in communities around the world: Cambodia, Dominican Republic, Ghana, India, Myanmar, Philippines, Romania and Thailand.

#### What is Violence Against Women and Children?

Because women and children around the world often are not effectively protected by the law, they are particularly - and often disproportionately - vulnerable to violent abuse.

IJM's teams in Uganda, Colombia, Peru, Guatemala, Bolivia, El Salvador and Kenya work to address sexual violence and domestic violence.

#### What is Police Abuse of Power?

In many places, police not only fail to protect people in poverty from violence, but they are perpetrators of violence themselves. IJM's team in Kenya work to address police abuse of power.

Currently there are 11 of us but soon we will not have enough seating. No one seems keen in braving the church building which was originally an old factory where there is no insulation or heating. As with any small group we are able to get to know each other more personally and share and pray together as well as studying the Word.

He was so chuffed and now his friends are on the list for something similar. The ministry of the crosses continues and Philip is working hard to keep up with the supply and demand.

#### Pledge Committee - Emergency Fund

In response to the devastating earthquake in Myanmar the Pledge Committee has donated £500 on behalf of Witham URC to Christian Aid's Myanmar Earthquake Appeal. Myanmar is one of the world's lowest-income countries in the world and was hit by a 7.7 magnitude earthquake, followed by a 6.4 magnitude aftershock.

The earthquake that struck central Myanmar has destroyed homes and left people in urgent need of drinking water, food and shelter. Christian Aid are working closely with their partners and networks in the area to identify the extent of the damage and the risks to communities there. Access to vital services such as water, power and basic foods have been critically disrupted. The immediate emergency support that Christian Aid is providing includes offering food parcels, water kits, shelters and other essential supplies. They have experience of working in the area and plan to stay supporting over the coming months as needs are assessed and appropriate responses are put in place.

## Pray for those affected by the earthquake

God, our strength and our refuge,

We pray to you for the people of Myanmar.

We hold in mind those who are injured or have been bereaved.

We ask your protection for everyone awaiting rescue.

I do hope you are enjoying the current sunshine & are keeping well. House of Grace is busy & we see God's hand in the work we are doing there.

Our fourth resident joined us in February, bringing the house to full occupancy. He is settling in well & we feel blessed that the other residents have been welcoming & supportive. It is so important when sharing facilities that all are considerate towards one another and where possible seek to create a thoughtful & kind environment.

We were delighted when one of our residents who has been attending the Bethel church completed an Alpha course & went on to be baptised. He regularly helps at the Well café & enjoys their loving support.

Two other residents have undertaken a fair amount of voluntary & paid work. Their clients remark on the way they undertake work with consideration, competence & reliability. Several have invited them back for further work. If at a later date our residents are going to move on to independent living, it is important that they are able to support themselves financially. Experience & clientele now will all build towards this. There is more capacity to take on other work (gardening/painting/general maintenance) so please get in touch with us if you are aware of people seeking help.

The problem we had with the flat roof extension to the house, is being fixed by replacing the roof in the next few weeks. This has turned out to be a more expensive job than first thought & we are grateful for some very generous donations which will help pay for the work.

We have been blessed with some brilliant fundraising events which have helped replenish the coffers. We are so grateful for these and for your ongoing financial support & prayers. Our lease payments have gone up, as have the house costs so we need to continue to seek finance, trusting our faithful God to provide for our ongoing needs.
