Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends

I write this on the eve of the eightieth anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz, while last week saw the inauguration of the 47thPresident of the USA. Who would have thought Auschwitz and the evil of the political force behind it would be linked to the President by the action of a billionaire supporter?

Germany was once home to an evil the world had never before seen, but had that billionaire supporter performed his action on the streets of modern day Germany he would be arrested. The Bishop of Washington, Mariann Edgar Budde, asks the President to have mercy upon those people of America who are scared of him and is criticised for doing so.

It seems we live in "interesting times".

To whom should we cling when our world is turned upside down? Last Sunday I heard a discussion between stand up comics from different faiths, they were posed questions as to how their faith informed their routines and were there barriers that could not be crossed. Apparently the Pope has recently said that it was OK to make fun of God, that he is big enough that he didn't mind. One comic, a Muslem, said that they could not, going on to say that they didn't know God as a person and so could not make fun of him. For me that was a Eureka moment! Greetings and blessings to our Witham Church Family. Denise and Philip Vinton

Christmas 2024 will now be a memory and for us a very different festive period in South Africa. Somehow Father Christmas and tinsel did not look quite the same but Christ's birth remains the real reason for celebration wherever we are.

We had an early Christmas Day at the beginning of December when we had the pure pleasure of treating 300 children to a food hamper including preloved toys, a large hot dog freshly cooked on the braii (BBQ) and a cup cake. There were some big smiles all round although some of the little ones found their food hamper too heavy to carry. Fortunately we had a number of volunteers at the ready.

In addition to the food we were able to provide the older girls with vanity bags complete with goodies inside and the older boys socks, playing cards etc. One little girl had her dream come true. She had been saving her Mula (points earned for collecting recycling materials) and purchased her first bicycle. A great day and the last one until 20 January as it is holiday time here and generally we only operate the Project during school terms. Thank you for your financial gifts – what a difference it has made. We have spare money too so looking at providing a geyser so we can have hot water on the premise.

At the time of writing our container is still travelling around the east coast of South Africa and we have no idea when it will finally arrive so we are learning to make do with minimal everyday items with borrowed plates and bowls.

However we are quite comfortable, have a bed, sofa and TV, a beautiful outlook, stunning beach just down the end of the road and lo sunshine. There are weaver birds building their distinctive hanging nests the trees adjacent to us and in the higher trees a colony of herons – at least 14 together with their young which are very vocal. We have learnt that a group of herons is called a seige. We have seen a school of dolphins playing in the bay which is not unusual but we thought was really cool. We have forgotten what sweaters and long trousers are like but of course we are in mid summer and we have to experience a winter as yet.

We continue to make connections in the local church we attended when we visited last year. When we spent 3 months here in 2023/24 Philip did some research as to what Church we might fit in. My daughter knew of someone who attended a local Church and we arranged to meet her at the door on our first Sunday. We have no explanation but we had stuck in our heads that this person attended Fathers House Church so off we set for 9.00 am service (still getting used to that time). When we arrived there was no one at the door and nobody knew this person but we stayed and felt so at home and continued to worship there. It turns out that this lady was waiting for us a couple of miles away at a completely different venue. We have seen her and apologised. We are certain that God directed us to where he wanted us. Over many months the Fathers House team in Jeffreys Bay have been praying about their next move. The large Church in Port Elizabeth wanted to close our church and amalgamate with them but they are an hours car journey from our community.

Apart from which we are a growing church which consisted of only 5 people about 5 years ago and now at least 100 attend Sunday Service.. However our pastor and his team are convinced, and wholeheartedly agree, that there is work to do in JBay. As from February we become an independent body called Abide Church. We believe that God has placed us here and is going to use us in some way. A case of watching this space.

If you should want to follow what is happening on the Jbay Recycling Project which has been magnificently supported by Witham URC, they post on Facebook and Instagram. You may get a glimpse of one of us although one of the videos featured mainly my rear end which was not particularly flattering!.

She smiled with relief as he was sentenced to 14 years in prison.

Hana now lives in a shelter, where she attends school and is continuing to receive psychological support. Cathy shared, "She confided that she [now] has peace of mind. Being able to continue with her studies gives her so much joy. She feels safe." Hana's aunt and guardian is delighted to see Hana making steps towards recovery: "It is not easy, but she is healing." Thank you for giving hope to children like Hana. Your donation is vital because thousands of children desperately need support to recover from trafficking and abuse. But when we take action together, hope and healing are possible. What's more, your gift will help build a world where children, women and men are safe and not abused in the first place.

We could not have wished for 3 nicer men who are considerate and caring, supportive of one another and eager to give back to the community supporting them.

Two of our residents have been with us for 6 months and the other for 4 months. During this time they have undertaken casual gardening and outdoor maintenance work, worked as a regular volunteer at the Bethel 'Well' café and been willing to support various church functions, moving furniture, fetching and carrying etc. All recipients of their labour have praised the standard of their work, their reliability and their cheerfulness. In 2025 we want to grow the amount of paid employment offered to them. (All earnings are declared to DWP and their universal credit adjusted accordingly). This is where you can help. If you or any friend/relatives have any jobs you think they might be able to help with, please contact Emmelia van der Walt/Audrey Kennedy or myself. The cost is £12 per hour per workman. Not only does working provide extra income to our residents, it boosts their morale and work skills. We are very aware of the amount of prayer support which has underpinned the House of Grace and thank you for this from the bottom of our hearts. We know that without the intervention of God and your help none of this would have happened. While we rejoice in having reached the point where we are in our journey, we also acknowledge that the road ahead will be steeper. We are all on a steep learning curve. Our sisters in The Cook Islands welcome us and lead us for the Day of Prayer 2025. This group of 15 islands in the South Pacific Ocean has a rich and colourful Māori heritage and a deep connection to nature. Join with us as we pray together and reflection the theme 'I made you wonderful'.

The World Day of Prayer is an international, ecumenical organisation which enables us to hear the thoughts of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers.

The Day of Prayer is celebrated in over 120 countries. It begins in Samoa and prayer in native languages travels throughout the world— through Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas before finishing in American Samoa some 38 hours later. A world wide wave of prayer.

The service this year shares the stories of three different generations of Christian women from Cook Islands, who have shared stories of their struggle during Covid-19, of devaluation of their culture and of the improvements in obstetric health care. Based on the words of Psalm 139, and woven within the stories, this worship service invites us to recognise that God created each one of us with great attention and loving care.

Fellowship Afloat is one of our nominated charities for 2025



Fellowship Afloat's lightship 'Trinity' is a unique place for adventure, relaxation and exploring the environment.

Based on a converted lightvessel moored on the coast at Tollesbury, it's an ideal activity venue for youth clubs, schools, churches, special needs groups and those wishing to gain sailing and power boating qualifications. Guests are served by the centre staff and expert volunteers, who form the lively Christian community which is Fellowship Afloat.

In 1965, the inspiration for what was to become Fellowship Afloat grew out of a summer camp for a Harlow church youth group. The young leaders of that camp dreamed of creating a permanent venue for young people to enjoy the challenge and excitement of outdoor activities – especially sailing and other outdoor activities – while providing an introduction to the Christian faith, and the possibility of developing a friendship with God.

The search began for something floating on which to start the venture, and a place from which to operate. This led the youth group leaders to the unique charms of the Blackwater estuary and to the purchase of the oyster smack *William Emily*. Quickly joined by local supporters, they took on the task of restoring her to glorious sail.

The venture grew, but so did a need for a larger base, and the former Thames sailing barge Memory was to meet that need. In 1968 an anonymous donation enabled the group, by then established as a charitable trust, to purchase her. Moored alongside the old Gridiron Pier by Rickers Hard in Tollesbury's saltmarshes, with accommodation for 22 and a cosy saloon, she became the weekend retreat for groups of young people who ventured into the estuary in sailing dinghies. Very quickly other groups from local authorities and probation offices discovered that a residential visit could challenge and benefit young offenders.

Groups continued to visit *Memory* and many primary school groups became regular users. By the late 1980s it was realised that the old barge was in need of replacement. More accommodation was required and, though chemical toilets and paraffin lighting had given the centre a unique atmosphere since the early days, these facilities could not remain as they were. One thing was for sure, the new centre would have to float, so the search for a suitable craft ensued.

In 1988 a retired Trinity House light vessel was inspected in Harwich Harbour. She was perfect: full of history, with potential to become a purpose-built activity centre – and in remarkable condition. Donations enabled the trust to buy 'Light vessel Number 15' and, in the September of 1988, she was towed into the Gridiron berth where *Memory* had been previously moored. Plans were drawn up to create visitors' cabins for 36, with toilets and showers plumbed into the local sewage works, and a galley and saloon to seat 50, with the existing crew's accommodation being devoted to staff use.

Over the next 30 years many young people enjoyed the life-changing experience of a week or weekend on Trinity. From 2016 – 2023 further upgrades were undertaken, the engine room was converted into new showers and toilets, accessible and ensuite cabins added, the galley extended, a new entrance and reception area built, and a new mooring to piles constructed.

Fellowship Afloat sounds very established now – a far cry from those pioneering days in the 1960s. But now, as then, the trust is dependent entirely upon its volunteers who help run the courses, and on its wider fellowship of friends and supporters for their inspiration, skills, giving and prayers.

Over the last fifty years, many thousands of children, young people and visitors have heard about God's love and for many it has been a life changing experience.

Algorithms can paint masterpieces and compose symphonies in the style of the great Johann Sebastian Bach. Google is even developing artificial moral reasoning so driverless cars can make decisions about potential accidents. But AI is not a person, it is software.

Thanks to AI, you can talk to "Jesus" online for free. But is this a good thing? "Welcome, my children! I'm AI Jesus, here to answer your questions 24/7. Whether you're seeking spiritual guidance, looking for a friend, or simply want someone to talk to, I'm here for you. Join me on this journey through life and discover the power of faith, hope, and love."

The oracle, Wikipedia states,: "The history of AI began in antiquity, with myths, stories, and rumours of artificial beings endowed with intelligence or consciousness by master craftsmen. The study of logic and formal reasoning from antiquity to the present led directly to the invention of the programmable digital computer in the 1940s, a machine based on abstract mathematical reasoning. This device and the ideas behind it inspired scientists to begin discussing the possibility of building an electronic brain." Greetings - Timothy oshoiribhor

My name is Timothy oshoiribhor. I am married to Josephine oshoiribhor with three children.

I joined Witham United Reformed Church in March 2023, since then it has become a family. I wish to let you know about the project that I have in Nigeria, since I started ministry work many years ago and God has been faithful.

After my service as a minister of God in the 90s, with the cooperation of some ministers, we established a ministry in Nigeria with the name, RAWWORD EVANGELICAL MINISTRY in the year 2012, January 1st.

Over the years, God has been faithful and great to us. Along the way our community head brought some people who had no place to live, they are survivors from war in Liberia, Sierra Leone and other parts of Africa, since when they lived in the church premises.

As time goes on, I was able to apply for resettlement for some with the UN and they were taken to America, where they live now.

The others have been with us in the church with many other widows, orphans and less privileged, both children aged 7, 12, 17 to 27 and above. Some cannot locate their parents and families anymore. We were able to create opportunities for few of them to go to school and to learn crafts .

So far, we have been able to survive with the help of friends, a few churches and good citizens. We live on a rented apartment, a place not well built, rain and wind is a big problem to us. They all, both old and young sleep on the floor in an open arcade, with some ministers taking care of them and the church and they all are exposed to wind and rain.

We need assistance to relocate to a better place and to feed and cloth them as they are increasing in numbers by the day. I do the little I can, anytime I am able. They need good accommodation, feeding and clothing.

However, we need space where we can move to permanently but we require funds to make this possible. It could happen to anyone, no one ever wished for that.

We need assistance to put a smile on their faces again.

I need your assistance in all ramifications to give them a happy life again .
